## PRE AND POST VISIT ACTIVITIES

### BRIGHT FROM THE START: GELDS

PRE-VISIT

#### GUIDING QUESTIONS

Are plants living or non-living objects?

What makes them living organisms?

How are plants different from other living organisms like animals or fungi?

How do leaves/flowers/stems/seeds/roots look different?

#### ACTIVITY Plant and Animal Drama

- Talk about the life cycle of a plant and act it out with your students by having them start as a seed on the ground and then slowly stretch and grow into a tall plant.
- Act out the things you might see at the Garden (butterfly, bird, bee, flower swaying in the wind, tall tree, worm, praying mantis, roly poly, frog, dragonfly, rock)

POST-VISIT

#### WRAP UP QUESTIONS

What did you see, hear and touch during our visit to the Garden?

How were some of the plants different?

How were some of the flowers different?

What animals did we see?

What non-living objects did we see?

#### ACTIVITY Plant a seed

Plant a seed and watch it grow (recommended seeds: beans, marigolds, zinnias, sunflowers).

What do seeds need to grow?

What does the plant need to grow?

#### ACTIVITY Design your own plant

Create your own plant using various art materials or by drawing/painting it on a piece of paper.

How is your plant unique?

## GARDEN ACTIVITIES

### LIVING VS. NON-LIVING

**Location:** Everywhere

As you walk through the garden, take note of all the living and non-living things you see and hear. Living organisms need food, air and water to move, grow and reproduce. Plants and animals are living things. Examples of non-living things are a rock or building. If you see someone taking care of the plants (water, trimming, planting), talk about what that person is doing to help the plants grow.

### LISTENING WALK

**Location:** Fuqua Conservatory, Tropical Rotunda

As you walk through the Tropical Rotunda, listen to the sounds around you. You may hear the trill of a Poison Dart Frog or the "CO-KEE" of the coqui frogs. Can you hear your feet walking over the bridge or the sound of the waterfall? This is a great activity to do throughout your visit. When you open up your ears, you can truly discover the orchestra of the Garden!

### TOUCH EXPLORATION

**Location:** Anne Cox Chambers Flower Walk

Gently touch the leaves growing along the Flower Walk, using two fingers. Can you find leaves that are soft, smooth, rough, or scratchy? Please ask students to keep their feet on the sidewalk when touching leaves.

### EATING A RAINBOW

**Location:** Edible Garden

Using your eyes, look for the colors of the rainbow in the Edible Garden. Can you find a red, orange, yellow, purple or blue fruit? Can you observe edible green leaves such as kale, lettuce, parsley? Which fruit or vegetable is your favorite? Feel free to smell and gently touch, but please do not pick or taste!






### GARDEN SCAVENGER HUNT
